A expedition to the India territory of Ladakh in search of the mysterious snow leopard turns into a personal journey. This fast-moving tale takes you into the forbidding Ulley Valley to finally spot these magnificent and mysterious cats.

David Swanson, "Visiting Vulcan's Lairs: A Tour of Italy's Mighty Volcanoes," Discover Silversea Don't come to Italy just for the food, come for the volcanoes. This homage to Italy's violent hills captures the dormant power of Vesuvius and its lasting imprint on the country.

You can almost smell the woodsmoke in this telling of a cooking class on a ranch in Los Cabos. The descriptions are delicious, and you get a recipe to boot!

BRONZE

Updated weekly, this offers travel agents and advisors a selection of current and upcoming events to share with clients. They range from the availability to book a tea or dinner inside a life-size gingerbread house to a waterfall light show 1,100 feet underground to Santa on the beach. These are curated by an experienced travel writer from across the country, with a diversity of styles, locations and activities. This useful roundup service also includes videos highlight some of the attractions.

SILVER

Mindy Poder, New Travel Advisor Businesses That Will Help the Industry Build Back Better, TravelAge West.

When life hands you a fistful of lemons, why not restructure you time and effort to squeeze out some lemonade? These examples demonstrate how four travel professionals decided to use downtime during the Pandemic to retool and reinvent the work of advisors with new tools, websites and podcasts that other professionals can emulate to maintain or grow their business in difficult times.

BRONZE

Christine Loomis. Secrets of Sustainability, Corporate & Incentive Travel.

Industry sustainability is a daunting undertaking, but as with most complex challenges, this challenge can be met by breaking it into smaller parts. Advice here includes start early with organization, venue, vendors and suppliers. Work to minimize excessive use of harsh chemicals. Maximize recyclables, reusables, donations. Use eco-friendly materials such as bamboo lanyards, options from vinyl signs and biodegradable utensils to advising travelers to bring their own water or coffee bottle. The author provides a useful gameplan and approach to a wide-ranging challenge.

Category 7: Website

This is what a travel website should look like, be and do, or any website really. The attractive design doesn't end with the Home page, but carries through with an open, airy, very-easy-to-navigate format with plenty of beautiful images that say "travel is to be enjoyed." The Home page includes a newsletter signup invitation without being an annoying popup, as well as the requisite links to social media. From that top page readers can mouse over a world map to select content from various countries and regions ... or select one of the promos across the top of the page, such as Dream Destinations or Guide to LegoLand. For those who prefer it, there's also a grid of boxes that readers can select for a global region or country. Reader engagement/feedback is invited again in a comment box at the bottom of the About page. And this is all enhanced by a writing style that's upbeat, casual and conversational, not just the facts nor lecturing nor talking down to readers.

SILVER

Maria Haase. San Diego Explorer/sandiegoexplorer.com

A good travel website need not always provide a global catalogue. All things local can be as inviting, interesting and attractive as promoting global wanderlust. San Diego is more than beaches, a world-class zoo and a massive Navy base. This website is everything San Diego, a deep dive into the varied neighborhoods as well as Things to Do, Top Attractions, Tips and the eBook restaurant guide. A Beautiful slide show rotator highlights topics/categories: Coronado hotels, beautiful La Jolla, pet-friendly hotels, best beach resorts and more.

BRONZE

Rina Nehdar. L.A. Family/lafamilytravel.com.

The website name refers to the author and her family, not to the scope of her work. And that work is an open, airy, light and breezy presentation of destination pieces, reviews, tips and glorious image from around the world, from California (not just L.A.) to Cancun, Europe, Florida and more. There's a strong focus on family adventures, traveling with teens, mommy getaways and weekend getaways. The first view of the website pulls the reader in with an action video of families enjoying travel, instead of the usual slide-show rotator.

Category 8: Adventure/health travel

GOLD

Juliana Broste, Mexico Surf Retreat with TravelingJules, YouTube

This buoyant video about a girl's surfing trip has you cheering along with our intrepid traveler. A great "show me" example of travel journalism.

SILVER

Debra Bokur, Sweet Harmony: Recharge your mana energy and find balance on legendary Lana'i Island, Global Traveler magazine

Beyond the lush resort and pineapple fields, we find the history and adventure of a least-traveled island. The writer uses her vast knowledge of the island to take you on a healing journey that evokes the mythical legacy of Lana'i.

BRONZE

James Murren, The Art of the Mapmaker, Mountain Flyer magazine

In a world where GPS only gives you with the next turn, this story makes you reconsider the true adventure of charting your own course — with a map. The writer journeys to Michaux State Forest in Pennsylvania to meet a mapmaker with deep insight into how following a contour map will push you toward your ultimate journey.

Category 9: Family/senior/special needs travel

Kari Bodnarchuk, A Family Getaway to Banff, That's Anything but Rocky, Boston Globe Thrilling family adventure that has you riding along with dogsleds in the Canadian Rockies. A fast-paced piece filled with travel ideas as well as typical mom angst.

SILVER

Jill K. Robinson, A Tent of One's Own, San Francisco Chronicle

In closed-down California, a family learns to create a little space — even it's a tent in the backyard, for an 11-year-old suffering the confines of the pandemic. A reflection of finding home when the road isn't an option.

BRONZE

Rich Grant, Mount Airy, North Carolina: Andy's Home Town, GoNomad.com
